Justice Luckert welcomed everyone to the meeting. She introduced Chief Justice Davis who gave a few opening remarks. Justice Luckert then had everyone in attendance introduce themselves.

Kelly O'Brien presented an overview of the various technologies currently in place in the district courts including case management, document imaging, and the piloting of online credit card payments for traffic cases.

The goals of the Electronic Filing System Committee are:

- Reducing costs for the court system;
- Reducing operating costs for attorneys, sheriffs, and others;
- Improving efficiency;
- Reducing paper usage;
- Protecting people's privacy;
- Preserving documents; and
- Improving access from a geographical prospective

There will be three subcommittees formed to work with Policy and Procedure, Technology, and Finance issues. The judicial website will be updated on a regular basis for public viewing regarding this project.

Steve Berndsen provided a handout showing an example of what a statewide project plan for electronic filing may look like. The various subcommittee activities throughout the next several months will lead to recommendations to the Kansas Supreme Court regarding the future direction of electronic filing. The implementation phase of a statewide electronic filing system will be a multi-year process. He addressed the geographical makeup of the state and the desire to create a single portal where documents can be filed from anywhere in the state.

Justice Luckert thanked everyone for their service and dismissed the full committee to reconvene in the subcommittee meetings.
